Small step:
Comparing Numbers to 5

Resources needed:

Vocabulary:
How many? numeral, more, less, greater, fewer, most, least

Children look at different pictorial representations of numbers up to 5. They count how many objects there are and then identify which group has more and which group has fewer.

Key questions:
How many objects are there? Which picture shows the most? Which picture shows the least? Who has more?
